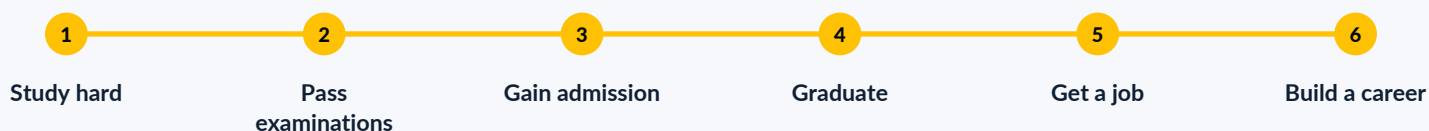
Preparation is no longer only about admission. It is also about exposure, confidence, and readiness for a different kind of world.
